After a long absence, the Veterans Day Program has become a most important event in the Newfolden Community. This is due in large part of the efforts of American Legion Post 427 Commander David Myhrer and former MCC Principal Ryan Johnson.

In 2014, Ryan approached Post 427 and informed us that MCC would be holding a Veteran's Day program, He asked if Post 427 would be a part of it. Since that program in 2014, we have been honored to partner with MCC in presenting the Veteran's Day program.

Everyone at MCC (school board, administration, faculty, staff & students) have been amazing to work with. A very special thanks to Superintendent Lund for his cooperation and support of this program.

When we first met with the school board and presented the idea of a display to honor a veteran, we were given permission and unanimous support by the board members. Since that time we have dedicated several other displays, honored veterans for 70, 60, & 50 years of continuous service in the American Legion. We also had the privilege of helping present a high school diploma to a WW2 vet who left school just prior to graduation. (atta boy Stuart).

I know of no other school which has allowed these kind of displays to be a part of their school.

There have been times while speaking and looking out at the students in attendance, or listening to the music which has been presented, that it has been both emotional and inspiring. It makes the holiday much more meaningful for me.



# The Class of 1969



Fifty years ago, in May 1969, the last class to be known as Newfolden High School graduates received their diplomas as they walked across the stage in what is now known as Newfolden Elementary. The next graduating class would walk the stage in the new high school across the road under the new name as Marshall County Central graduates.

This summer the Class of 1969 had their 50th year reunion. Twenty-nine classmates attended throughout the weekend. The following are memories they shared with us.

### Rebecca (Engen) Olson

I grew up in Holt. I attended Holt School grades 1-8. Holt school had 4 classrooms, with two grades in each room. One great advantage of double classrooms was if you didn't understand something the first year, you could hear it again the next year. The small class sizes were also great for more individual help. We not only knew our own classmates and their families well, the grade ahead of us and behind us. In a small community, we knew grandparents and aunts and uncles also!

Ninth grade was a big transition. The Newfolden, Viking and Holt 8th graders would now all be Newfolden High School 9th graders. The Holt and Viking students knew each other somewhat through our game days in the spring (softball and relays in Holt) and Basketball games in the winter (in Viking, since they had a gym). Holt's "gym" was a former classroom downstairs with a higher ceiling with a basketball hoop, but was no way high enough or big enough for a "court". Winter activity at Holt was skating - everyday! As a seventh grader our teacher was Glen Espe. He had a Polaris snowmobile that he brought

to school. We took turns driving on a track that was on the school grounds and off the school grounds. We even had timed races. I still can visualize 8th grader Christie Inman tipping the snowmobile over and seeing the track underneath going around and around!

The Newfolden gym and school seemed so big. Going from room to room for classes and having several different teachers was an adjustment to make. Our class of 1969 was very close knit. We all got along very well. There were many activities to keep us busy besides classwork.

The only sports back then were football, basketball and baseball...all boys sports. The girls were cheerleaders and there was pep club! There was a homecoming parade each year and working on the floats were so much fun. The chicken wire with tissues spray painted were used to make the floats. Our homecoming queen was Cindy Green Tikusis and her attendants were Mona Borg Olson and Diane Johnson Wiesner. Each grade also had an attendant.

There was Boys Chorus, Girls Chorus, Mixed Chorus

and small groups. The choirs wore gray gowns with purple dickies. The NHS band wore gray wool uniforms. Other activities to keep us busy were Spotlight staff (school newspaper), Librarians, Saga staff (school annual), Student Council, FHA made up of all girls (Future Homemakers of America), and Class Officers.

As juniors and seniors, our class presented a class play each year. Both featured teenagers Wilber (Keith Hanson) and Hercules (Brad Olson). They were situation comedies and so much fun to work on as a class. Our director was Gordon Collin.

When we were juniors, NHS had their first prom. It was held at the American Legion building, since dancing was not allowed on school property. It was held following the annual Junior-Senior banquet. As Seniors, the first prom was held in the school gym. The FHA also hosted a Christmas dance that year.

Each year the school had a carnival held in the gym. Games were set up and one of the highlights was a cake walk! Each class had candidates for king and queen. Our class won in 1969 - Queen Carol Liedberg Weaver and King Steve Johnson.

The school lunch program was headed up by Ella Nelson. Great lunches - nothing from a can, everything was made from scratch. For the thanksgiving meal she would be up at dawn to put the turkeys in the ovens!

The class of 1969 was the last graduating class of Newfolden High School. There after it was Marshall County Central. The graduates all sat on the stage. Milt McCauley was calling the students names and the diplomas were handed out. The diplomas were all gone from the table and more graduates were waiting for theirs. Why? Because there was a stack of diplomas still upstairs sitting in the office! The remaining graduates had their names called, but no diplomas handed out!

The class of 1961 had 41 graduates. We have had several class reunions and always had great turnouts and a special time with friends that we have had for 50+ years. We always invite classmates that for one reason or another did not graduate with us, but were part of our school years. Some of us were classmates for all 18 years! Smalls schools offer a special bond with your classmates, they become lifelong friends.

### Clarice Halvorson Floberg



Clarice Halvorson graduated from Newfolden High School in 1948. Following graduation, she attended a one year teacher training class for teaching in one room country schools. For the next 10 years, she taught in six different country schools in Marshall County, where the total number of students in each school ranged from 4 to 18. She was responsible for teaching every grade level, keeping the wood stove going, and making sure the school was kept tidy. She also attended off campus class and summer classes at Moorhead State College, obtaining her B.S. in Elementary Education. In 1968, Clarice accepted a position at Viking Elementary. For the following 30 years, Clarice taught Chapter 1 students in both Viking and Newfolden elementary schools.

She was chosen as MCC Educator of the Year in 1993. Teaching has always been her passion and she hopes she was able to impact the lives of her students in a positive way.

Clarice married Russell Floberg in 1957 and raised their family in rural Viking. They had 2 daughters who followed Clarice's path into teaching (one who teaches at MCC) and a son who was a college administrator. Currently, Clarice has 2 granddaughters who also teach at MCC.

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### Ardelle Tangquist Anderson



Ardelle Tangquist grew up on a farm west of Viking. She attended school in Viking for grades 1-8, graduating from Newfolden High School in 1952. After attending Thief River Falls Teachers Training for one year, Ardelle was hired as the 3rd and 4th grade teacher in Holt. In 1956, after marrying Hal Anderson, she was hired as a 3rd and 4th grade teacher in the new Viking Elementary. She taught until 1962, when she took some years off to raise her family. Ardelle returned to teaching in 1967, teaching in Viking until retiring in 1999. She then was a substitute teacher for 10 years, teaching everything from kindergarten to high school shop class.

She earned her B.S Elementary Education degree from Moorhead State College in 1972.

Chosen as MCC Teacher of the Year in 1985, she had this to say, "It was a challenge to me as a teacher to have a part in helping to build into my students the type of character and leadership needed by our nation and the world. I worked diligently to have a classroom characterized by politeness, cooperation, mutual respect, shared responsibilities, humor and cheerfulness."

Ardelle and Hal have 3 daughters. Two of her daughters and two of her granddaughters also are teachers.

## Edwin Mounger


G. Edwin Mounger was born and raised in Washington State, graduating from high school in 1941. He attended Washington State University for year and half before enlisting in the Army Air Corps in 1942, shortly after Pearl Harbor. He served as a supply clerk, pilot and tail gunner. Discharged from the army in 1946, he returned to Washington State University where in 1949 he earned a major in Industrial Arts and a minor in Psychology. He later earned a degree in Engineering from the University of Minnesota and completed coursework for a Master's degree in Industrial Arts from Moorhead State College.

After marrying his wife Marilyn, in 1947, he started as cabinet maker prior to his first teaching job in Industrial Arts. After teaching in Wapato, WA for two years, he moved to Minneapolis, becoming an engineer for Honeywell. He returned to cabinet making and "Eddie's Cabinet Shop" was born. After building and installing cabinets in 400 homes in the

Twin Cities, he returned to teaching. Ed and Marilyn moved with their two children to Newfolden in 1957. He taught Industrial Arts in a remodeled bus garage for eight years. Eddie was also very active in the community. In 1965, the family moved to the Hawley MN area, where he continued to teach for 4 years at Lake Park School. Eddie was named Carpentry Department Head at Moorhead Technical College in 1970. There he taught carpentry, cabinet making and architectural drafting for 11 years. Eddie retired from teaching in 1981, after which he built custom cabinets and remodeled homes. Eddie passed away in 2002 at the age of 79.

Eddie Mounger's legacy is seen in his students in Newfolden where it is firmly entrenched in the lives of countless young men who learned from his incredible skills and ability to demand excellence in all projects that left his shop. Many former students still say he was their favorite teacher and give him credit for their success in life. He recognized ability and was able to instill his work ethic and consistently high expectations in his students. Items produced in his shop are still present in the home of many students today over 50 years later. He formed an Industrial Arts Club that allowed students to compete with other schools in project fairs. Seventeen homes in the Newfolden district were remodeled with cabinets made by students in Eddie's shop classes. With his incredible sense of humor and amazing abilities, he rightfully earned the respect of all.

Eddie will forever be known as "Mr Mounger, our nonpareil shop teacher". His son Scott was present to receive his father's award.

## From the desk of Superintendent Jeffrey Lund

Exciting things at MCC for 2019-2020

We are one month into our 2019-2020 school year. It has been a busy start of our school year. Our enrollment is up for our third year in a row. Four years ago we had 387 students. This year we are at 436. I started with the district in 2004. I recall our enrollment that year was 365 students. It's remarkable that we continue to gain students in a time period that many area rural schools have been declining in enrollment. I believe a big reason for our school growing is our mission: Building a foundation and future of educational excellence - one student at a time and our goals of promoting citizenship, having effective communication, working towards strong student achievement, and always finding ways to improve.

We have seen much growth in our elementary grades. Every grade is now two sections. Staff at both schools are growing together as a team and are busy helping our students. Main goals in elementary are to promote the love and importance of reading, developing independence, helping our students learn responsibility, and helping students learn how to complete work and projects together through collaboration and teamwork.

Our high school has a strong career/college preparation focus providing a variety of experiences and opportunities so our students have a firm plan for life after high school. We hired a full time counselor this year to help our students explore their choices further. Our shop students are building a mini-home on a trailer and a fish house on a trailer this year that will be raffled again. In recent years we have been providing many college credit options from our own teachers or through online opportunities which helps our students get a jump start. We usually use our outdoor classroom and prairie area more; however, the wet weather has provided some challenges.

We are excited about our upcoming Veterans Day Program. We continue our tradition working with the Newfolden Legion Post. This year's program will be held on November 11 at 1:00 p.m. This is a change from the time we have posted on the print calendars. Establishing a regular Veterans Day program has been wonderful for our school and community. It helps our students understand the importance of honoring and respecting the sacrifices our service members give to protect our freedom and liberty.

We encourage any alumni in the area or just visiting to come to any of our school events. The growth of the MCC Education Foundation has led to many past graduates stopping in to see the good things happening at our schools. We've seen an increase in the amount of scholarships offered and contributions to school programming since the foundation has started. We value and are very thankful for the visits, the contributions, and support provided by alumni and the Education Foundation.
